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
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ON THE COVER



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N HAWAIIAN CULTURE names are a big deal. Nā kūpuna (the ancestors) believed that a keiki (child) would grow into the characteristics of their name. If a baby boy was named, Nalu (Wave), his temperament would be wild and unpredictable like the surf. In contrast, if a little girl was given a name like, Mālie (Calm), she would mature to eventually be a peaceful person with a calming effect on others. So with all of this cultural knowledge there was a lengthy process and discovery phase to give this new magazine in your hands a name that had a purpose. We chose the name *Ama* with the intention to honor Outrigger Canoe Club's Hawaiian lineage, pay homage

to this publication's past and create a magazine that will be coveted like a good book. The outrigger of a canoe is called an *Ama* in 'Ōlelo Hawai'i (Hawaiian Language). It

was a nautical innovation that allowed the Polynesians to efficiently navigate the rough waters of the Pacific. The Ama is also the port hull of a double-hulled canoe, which is the vehicle that brought the Hawaiians to these beautiful subtropical islands. Ama felt right from the first time we said it out loud, and we hope you, the reader, will feel our intention



with this inoa (name) as you flip through the pages.

Just like *Ama*, the name of the publishing company, Hau Tree Collective, was intentionally selected to honor place, more specifically, the grounds of the Outrigger Canoe Club. OCC members know where the Hau tree is located on the property because it serves as an iconic landmark and the namesake of the Terrace. Perhaps, a lesser-known fact about Hau (Hibiscus tiliaceus) is that its lumber was used to make the Ama of the canoes in Ancient Hawai'i because the wood was light and durable.

The inaugural issue of *Ama* is an introduction to the new aesthetic and design of this membership magazine. Always acknowledging sense of place, we call the beginning of this publication, "The Lobby," because this is the room that first greets guests of the Outrigger Canoe Club. This section of *Ama* is the latest happenings of the Club, events calendar, highlight members' achievements and suggestions of how to make full-use

of the Club's numerous amenities and facilities.

Hunter Pflueger crowned International Surfing Association Prone Distance World Champion

represented the Outrigger Canoe Club on Team USA alongside Maui SUP athletes Conner Baxter and Ryan Funk at the ISA World SUP and Paddleboard Championships in beautiful Hainan, China. After a hard-fought silver medal in the prone technical race, Hunter was hungry for gold in the 18km distance event. With the course covering three laps there was a lot of race strategy involved with no one wanting to lead the pack and pull the other competitors. Hunter knew that in order to defeat defending world champion,

Lachie Lansdown of Australia, he would have to challenge him on the course well before the finish. After two conservative laps with the Australian, South African, New Zealand and French athletes bunched together, Hunter made his move on buoy one of the last lap. Amazingly he broke the group and won by a substantial two-minute margin! Team USA went on to win silver in the team relay and finished second behind defending powerhouse Australia. The camaraderie shared between the countries was amazing as host China held an excellent event.



How You Know:

Keanuenue Rochlen

(Jan. 29, 1928 - Jan. 28, 2010)



➤ Cover Model Jenna Bleu Forti comes from a canoe paddling lineage. Most notably, her grandmother, Keanuenue Rochlen, was a legendary steers-woman and was elected a Winged "O" in 2005. She joined the Club in 1955, and represented OCC in canoe racing, volleyball, baseball and tennis. It's said that Keanuenue probably won more gold medals for paddling than any other female paddler in Hawai'i. During her lifetime, she competed in every single state championship since the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association was founded in 1952, and won numerous races and championships.

Five Tips To Selecting A Great Wine For You and Your Guests

"Don't be afraid of wines with a 'screw cap'."



My name is Rede Eder, and I am the new Food & Beverage Director for the Outrigger Canoe Club. After years of serving guests in both fine dining and casual dining, right here in Hawai'i, I believe my responsibility is to share with guests and this membership everything having to do with the food we create and the beverages that we offer.



I know there are members of Outrigger Canoe Club who have great knowledge about wines, this article is not for them. This is for those members who are new to wine or would like to learn more about wine. Outrigger Canoe Club has a wonderful selection of wine in its cellar. What? Wait, we have a cellar? Yes, we

have a beautiful cellar in the "dark caverns" below the Club filled with a variety of old and new world wines.

What kind of wine is the right choice? How do you pick a wine if you are entertaining? Where does one start? Well, a couple of my favorites from our cellar are the Jordan Alexander Valley Cabernet Sauvignon and the Chassange Montrachet from Cote de Beaune, a wonderful white Burgundy (Chardonnay) from France. Perhaps these wines are not what you're looking for so I want to share tips on how to choose a wine suited to you.

1.

Keep It Light

If you are new to wine, start with a white or rose. These wines tend to be lighter and more palatable for the new connoisseur.

2.

Personal Preference

A good wine is what tastes good to you. Don't get caught up on pricing. Lots of great wines can be found that will not break the bank.

3.

<u>No Be Scared</u> Don't be afraid of wines

with a "screw cap." These wines are designed to be enjoyed during the year of their release and a twist off cap can offer an equal if not better seal on your wine. Check your next bottle of Ferrari Carano Fume Blanc. They have had a twist off cap for decades.

4.

Flavor Of Love

Think about the flavors you already like. For example, do you prefer apples to grapefruits? If so, you may prefer a sweeter wine over a drier wine to start with. Do you drink black coffee or prefer the softer flavor of a Latte? If you prefer your coffee black, you might be predisposed to old world styles of wine as opposed to those latte drinkers who will find new world wines more to their liking. Old world wines are wines that comes from places where wine originated, France, Italy and Spain are examples of old world wines. New world wines come from "newer" growing areas such as California, Australia and South Africa.

5.

Occasionally Correct

Consider the occasion. If you are entertaining friends and you are trying to match a variety of likes more than pairing with food, consider a bottle of red and a bottle of white. If you are more interested in the food pairing of wine, then consider the general rule of thumb, reds are for heavier foods like steaks and lamb. For lighter foods such as chicken or fish, enjoy a white wine. Want to swim against the current? You should consider having a Pinot Noir (lighter, red Burgundy style wine) with salmon.





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
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LEARN BY DOING Sushi Chef Eiji Suda

THERE IS AN 'OLELO NO'EAU (HAWAIIAN PROVERB) that says, "ma ka hana ka 'ike," or "learn by doing," and this perfectly describes the career path of the Outrigger Canoe Club's new sushi chef, Eiji Suda. Suda San is a soft-spoken man, who admits his English is not very good, but when you taste the food he creates with his hands it speaks loudly of his culinary talent.



uda San is 44-years-old and lives on Oʻahu with his wife and dog. He first moved to Hawaiʻi from New York in 2010, but he is originally from Osaka, Japan. From the beginning of his career, Chef Suda followed his passion and immersed himself in his chosen profession.

"After graduating high school, I went to sushi restaurants to start working," explains Chef Suda, "I didn't go to culinary school I learned [to make sushi] from senior chefs and master chefs."

This "hands-on" experience allowed Suda San to develop his craft in a very old-school way, much like an apprentice learning from a master. Watch. Be silent. Clean. Learn. Watch some more. Clean some more. And then, you master making the rice before even touching the knife to cut fish. In a society where every young cook wants to be a celebrity chef these days, you have to appreciate those that worked their way from the bottom to the top like Chef Suda. He worked in four prestigious sushi restaurants before coming to the Outrigger Canoe Club: two in Osaka Japan, one in New York and Morimoto Waikīkī.

Chef Suda's favorite sushi to make is Futomaki which literally means "big roll" in Japanese. This style of sushi is characterized by a long cylinder of rice with various vegetables, Sakura Denbu (sweet dried fish) and Tamagoyaki (sweet egg) rolled with nori on the outside and then thinly sliced. The chef suggests a nice dry sake to pair perfectly with Futomaki.

When Suda San is off the clock and he goes to a sushi restaurant he likes to first start with raw

fish and then move onto sushi that is cooked.


"My style when I go to sushi restaurant is sashimi first then after go to sushi, something cooked like octopus or shrimp," he says.

"[Sushi is] just cool," says Chef Suda when asked about why he loves making the handmade dish for a living.

And he's right. Today, this traditional Japanese slow food has become an internationally recognized delicacy that is fresh and attractive. Sushi is inherently sexy and has evolved a long way from its humble beginnings as a way of preserving fish in fermented rice. It was first developed in Southeast Asia and eventually made its way to China before sushi took hold in Japan sometime during the 8th century. One of the earliest forms of sushi was called Narezushi, which was salted, gutted fish that was stored in fermented rice for months in order to preserve the food. The rice would keep the fish from spoiling, and the rice was eventually discarded and only certain parts of the fish was consumed.



Back in the day, it used to take months to make sushi because of this preservation process. Today, you can just put your order in to one of the friendly servers at the Club and Chef Suda will have it ready for you before you can finish a beer. There is nothing like fresh sushi when it is made from highly-skilled and experience hands like Chef Suda's.

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
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
