

The OCC Bylaws and Member Handbook define the criteria for sponsorship and duties of the sponsor.

Few really study the requirements before asking for an application. So, here are the specifics:

→ Applications for membership must

be proposed by two voting members who have known the applicant for at least 2 years. Sponsors of applicants must be voting class Club members in good standing. Neither sponsor shall be a director, officer, member of Admissions and Membership Committee, parent or close relative of the applicant. Application forms must be obtained by the sponsor (not the applicant) from the Admissions Secretary. Sponsors of applicants for membership will be called upon to explain any discrepancies or misrepresentations detected on an application. Sponsoring members must interview with the applicant and ensure the

applicant is on time and wears appropriate attire. The sponsor traditionally arranges for welcoming the new member into the Club membership and providing orientation assistance. The Admissions & Membership Committee shows an introductory video and the GM holds regular orientation tours of the Club for new members. Thereafter, the sponsor may be called upon to explain any alleged violations of Club rules, Bylaws, and policies attributed to the new member, family or guests.

- Please avoid parking large vehicles adjacent to the ramp. Large trucks are prohibited from parking immediately adjacent to a ramp.
- No overnight parking.
- Please do not park bicycles, mopeds or motorcycles overnight or without a valid OCC parking decal.

Outrigger Canoes Escort USS Hawaii Into Port

▶ On June 6, as part of a tribute, to the 75th anniversary of D-Day and to welcome home the USS Hawaii after a six-month deployment, we had the honor and privilege of escorting the state-named fast-attack submarine into Pearl Harbor. The 150 returning sailors received a true Hawaiian blessing as they entered Pearl Harbor, greeted by family and friends as well as support commands. The harbor was filled with cheers of family, the sound of Navy ships blasting their horns in salute, a Blackhawk helicopter and our two Outrigger canoes.

On the way back out of the harbor after the USS Hawaii was tied up at the pier, we paddled directly alongside its hull to personally greet the sailors...

The USS Hawaii is the first commissioned warship of the United States Navy to be named afer the 50th state. On its emblem is the USS Hawaii's motto Kupale 'Aina, meaning "Defending the Land". This Virginia-class attack submarine is the Navy's latest undersea warfare platform and incorporates the latest in stealth, intelligence gathering and weapons systems technology.


Paddling alongside a 377-foot nuclear-powered submarine, 'holding water' beside the Mighty Missouri battleship in the hallowed waters of the Arizona Memorial, and racing the nuclear sub across the harbor with the whirling blades of the Blackhawk helicopter overhead was truly a "chicken skin" adventure for all twelve of us.

On the way back out of the harbor after the USS Hawaii was tied up at the pier, we paddled directly alongside its hull to personally greet the sailors, express our appreciation for their service, and welcome them home with leis and shakas.

We'd like to express our sincere gratitude to OCC leadership for allowing the use of Club assets for this event, and to the U.S. Navy for granting us access to the secure harbor. More importantly, we are thankful to all U.S. servicemen, past and present, who have helped defend our great country.



RELEVANT TO THE BROAD VARIETY OF SKILLS and knowledge the Outrigger Canoe Club Beach Services possesses, this is the most frequently asked question the team receives with each beautiful new day in Hawai'i nei. However, it's a question best saved for quick chats on the sand since the team shoulders so many crucial roles — from water education to equipment maintenance to medical response — as they uphold the Club's mission statement of providing "a place where man may commune with sun and sand and sea, where good fellowship and aloha prevail and where the sports of old Hawai'i shall always have a home."



T

he team is led by the well-loved and esteemed Beach Captain Sam Clemens, who grew up near the beach in Waimanalo on Oahu's east side. (If his name sounds a little familiar, it's due to his direct relation to Samuel Langhorne Clemens, a man better known as Mark Twain who first came to Oahu in 1866 on special assignment for a Sacramento newspaper.) Sam is a certified

lifeguard who grew up body surfing, skim boarding, and boogie boarding, a sport he mastered to the point of becoming a national champion in his youth. Comfortable on boards of all sorts, Clemens was also a four-time national skateboarding champion in his twenties. Sam is also a certified lifeguard instructor and CPR & first aid instructor and is the supervisor of lifeguards at Bellows Airforce Station. Aptly referred to as "a waterman's waterman" in the past, his prowess at all things aquatic expanded to include sailing, paddling, and steering the surfing canoes OCC is famous for. He added these skills upon beginning work with the Club in 1998 following ten years with the City and County of Honolulu's Parks and Recreation Department introducing ocean sports programs to recreation centers across the island.

Clemens works directly with Shannon Pelkey, the Club's athletic

director who oversees the tight-knit Beach Services staff. A coach and personal trainer for 20 years with a master's degree in physical education, Pelkey loves athletics and is a national certified strength and conditioning specialist. Like the rest of the team, she is a lifeguard who is CPR certified, a trained emergency medical responder, and a waterwoman as a novice A paddler. Pelkey said that Beach Services' offerings keep members of all ages entertained and intimately connected to Hawai'i's beaches and waters.

"There are members over the age of 70 who participate and enjoy all the activities provided by Beach Services," Pelkey said. "For our junior members, Beach Services and the Beach & Water Safety Committee host the Kō Kainalu program. It's a week-long kids program in the summer that teaches the kids about the ocean, the reef, hazards, the equipment, safety, CPR, and has an educational portion that includes a visit to the Bishop Museum and, this year, a visit to Shark's Cove [on the North Shore] to learn about marine life and the history out there."

The Beach Services team is exactly the group of people you'd want around if anything goes wrong. All members of Beach Services are certified lifeguards and are CPR & first aid certified. Also, the majority of the staff are certified emergency medical



responders and there are two full-time EMTs. Let's meet the team!

Leilani Shaw is a 10-year veteran who is the primary CPR & first aid instructor in the department and came to OCC with nurse's aide experience. She grew up in Mililani and spent time in the ocean doing competitive sailing at the Waikiki Yacht Club. When she has the chance, she volunteers with the local nonprofit AccessSurf helping physically-challenged watermen and women get into the waves, and works with the Hawai'i Marine Animal Response team.

Deroy Lupica, a teammate of eight years, also works as a federal lifeguard with the Bellows Airforce Station and is one of the most experienced canoe surfers and canoe sailors on the beach staff. He grew up in the Waikiki-Kapahulu area, spending his free time surfing

at Kaiser Bowls. He is an experienced surfinstructor, a canoe steersman clinic instructor, the Ko'Kainalu program organizer, a competitive paddler, and a blue belt Jiu-Jitsu practitioner.

Malek Hurd, a six-year veteran, is one of the two full-time EMTs on staff, holds a degree in education, and along with Deroy, is one of the steersman clinic instructors in the department.

Five-year veteran Benjamin Stout also works for City & County lifeguards and has extensive previous lifeguard experience. He was a member of the Hawai'i-Pacific University Symphony Orchestra and has his degree in German.

Justin Puerto, the department's wall-sit challenge record-holder, has been on the crew for four years. Aside from being a former competitive surfer, he is the most


accomplished Jiu-Jitsu practitioner on the team, being a purple belt level, an instructor, and a competitor.

Christani Arellano is a fulltime EMT, a National Guard veteran with training as a critical care flight paramedic and has been a team member of nearly four years.

Three-year veteran Jeremy Soares is one of the six team members who holds an ocean technician certification. He was a competitive bodyboarder and has strong skills with the canoes and boats.

The newest crew member,
Tommy Johnson, grew up on Kauai
and has been putting his years as
a surfer and waterman to use with
Beach Services for a year and a half.
He is also one of the three Jiu-Jitsu
practitioners (a blue belt) on the
team, and just graduated from the
University of Hawai'i with a degree
in pacific islands studies.

When they're on land during the day, this athletic and capable crew can be found at the Beach Desk, constantly monitoring the ocean for anyone who may be needing assistance and for general knowledge on the state of the surf, weather, and level of risk from jellyfish in the water. Each member of the team is a certified canoe steersman ranging from levels 1 to 5, and they are the team who are called



upon by members and their families to help honor passed members with meaningful ash-scattering ceremonies from the canoes. Additionally, they maintain the beach volleyball courts and Fitness Center, and assist with all matters pertaining to equipment maintenance and repair. However, the majority of their time is spent supplying the beachy fun to members with rental of the equipment, which includes eleven surfboards, four prone paddleboards, three four-man canoes, and one sailing canoe, the Holoholo. Members can also access life-saving CPR and AED (automated external defibrillator) courses through the Club's Beach Services.

The staff offers level 1 canoe steering certification courses with the



opportunity for interested members to advance their certification to levels 2-5 later with member instructors. The Club currently boasts over 300 members at varying levels on the Certified Steersmans List who are permitted to check out the four-man canoes daily during the summer. Beach Services works with the Club's Sailing Canoe Committee to take members on the highly popular sailing canoe rides in the Holoholo.

Some of the Club's youngest members are welcome to partake in the fun ocean sports made accessible by Beach Services, with children 10+ able to rent surfboards to ride the gentle waves rolling in to shore at Waiki-ki, youths 15+ eligible to become certified canoe steersman, and members age 18+ welcome to rent prone paddleboards. Children under the age of 12 who get to feel the elation of surfing in the Holoholo or any of the four-man canoes helmed by a certified steersman will have the added safety of a required life vest.

The Outrigger Canoe Club has one of the longest-standing beach services teams in Waikiki, and today that legacy of ensuring the fun and safety of Club members on the sand and sea is in the capable hands of a well-trained and fun-loving crew who are more than deserving of the admiration and appreciation they receive with each sunny, wave-filled day on the clear blue waters they adore."

OCC Junior Waterman Program is back for the Summer!

Kō Kainalu — "Of or belonging to the ocean wave"

This rigorous waterman pro**gram** created in 2004 is back for summer 2019. Hosted by the Beach Services Department and the OCC Beach & Water Safety Committee, the purpose of Kō Kainalu is to educate our youth on coastal and ocean science and recreation, and to perpetuate the Hawaiian waterman lifestyle through education and practice. OCC junior members ages 10-13 will have the opportunity to develop their swimming, surfing, paddling and canoe sailing skills with Deroy and Captain Sam. CPR and first aid instructor Leilani will lead essential lifesaving and CPR instruction. Also planned are snorkeling trips to the North Shore and a cultural visit to Bishop Museum. Activities are weather and ocean-dependent, and subject to change. The program runs Monday — Friday, July 22—26, 8:00 a.m. — 2:00 p.m. Class size is limited. 

OCC's Impact on the World of Paddling, and Beyond

Kiani Yost has been paddling in an outrigger canoe for seven years, since she was eight years old. But now, she's learning how to paddle all over again, thanks to OCC's new junior youth paddling programs—Na Kama o Kapua (NKOK) for the girls, Ka Lahui Kai (OKLK) for the boys. She's now paddling twice a day, jumping in a one—man canoe in the morning and then joining her teammates in a six—man in the afternoon. She's had to relearn her stroke completely, replacing it with a Tahitian technique, in which so much water is pulled with each stroke, she says it feels like her paddle is moving through concrete.

Hawai'i hasn't won the Molokai Ho'e since 2005.

The Tahitians have dominated the race for more than a decade, and the coaches behind the junior paddling program decided it was time to reclaim Hawaii's turf. They would learn from the Tahitians while teaching the kids the physical strength to paddle the channel and the psychological strength to lead a community.

Anthony Hunt, coach of NKOK, says Hawaii's paddling association has long had programs for everyone, from 10 year olds to 70. He adds, "What is different now is there's been a huge push of investment in energy, personnel and resources with the junior programs in paddling."

"It all began seven years ago," says Alan Pflueger, head of OKLK. "Ultralight canoes came out and that allowed us to get young kids out in the ocean doing bigger things safely." In 2013, he trained a crew of boys in the open ocean, and they raced the Molokai as a renegade crew because they were under the age limit. Each year since then, more junior boys crews have raced.

Hunt says, "They have been doing stuff that no one in Hawaiian canoe paddling has done. They've been setting precedent in the ages they're doing long coastal races, doing long solo races, doing channel

crossings, doing all kinds of stuff. It's really been transformational in the world of paddling. They're now producing boys who are doing things that were once thought to be only possible by adults."

Now, there are 71 boys in OKLK and 74 girls in NKOK. Yost says, "It's really cool to see the younger generation crossing the channel at 13 and 14 years old. That wasn't even in my mind when I was that young. It shows how far girls paddling can go and that the next generation of paddlers is coming. As the new coaching has shown, it's pushed us to really want to be better, and has shown us that we can be better."

She says that with the availability of new equipment, like the one-man canoes, it's opened up a whole new dimension of the sport that she didn't previously have access to. She completed her first Na Wahine O Ke Kai last year, and now she's contemplating a one-man relay channel crossing as well.

Previously, the junior paddling programs trained for the spring regatta season, a series of


sprints averaging half a mile. Now, the programs have turned their attention to distance racing, culminating in the 40-mile channel crossing. "We're using the sport as a platform to really develop a lot of positive character traits in youth," says Pflueger. "From teamwork to hard work, to overcoming challenges and believing in yourself, and pushing through things that are difficult, and being successful as a team. Distance allows that, versus a regatta sprint, where the mental side is not there to create questions in your mind that create opportunities to grow."

The junior paddling programs are open to all youth. "If you have the desire and you have a positive attitude; if you can't afford it, we will support




you 100%," Pflueger says. "No experience is necessary, we can teach you everything. We don't care where you live, what school you go to."

The paddling community outside of OCC has noticed the effect the programs have had. Jim Foti, executive director of the Kanaka Ikaika, an organization that promotes ocean paddling sports through a racing series, says not only has the number of junior paddlers been climbing in the last few years, but they're also better trained. Before, in the regular six-man canoe season, the youth would start training in April and paddle until the state championship in July. "One of the reasons a lot of these junior paddlers are doing so

good now is because they're stepping outside of that box to do the one-man series all year long," says Foti. "They're doing other types of paddling and doing the Kanaka Ikaika throughout the whole spring and other independent races that are going on. So when April/May shows up, these kids are already at the top of their game. And then it's just refining it in the OC-6s."

"There are a lot of other kids out there that are really interested and chomping at the bit to do a lot of this stuff," says Foti. "Some of them end up joining the Outrigger and some of them stay steadfast where they live and where their roots are. There is a rise across the board, and obviously a lot of it is being triggered by what's happening with the Outrigger kids and the [juniors] program."

Manny Kaulukukui, race organizer for the Paddling

Athletes Association, says, "Assembling the Outrigger program just encourages more youth. There's definitely a surge from the Outrigger program. I don't think [there was] a program that dedicated itself to the one-man canoes for the junior division before. I think it will allow them to participate more in the main races like our Molokai race. Before, it was more intimidating, now it's more doable for them. It's definitely a good program—it's going in the right direction for building up our Hawai'i contingency for paddling."

Pflueger says the programs are more than about paddling though. "People look at this program as all about winning in a sport," he says. "But we use paddling as a platform to develop kids. Winning is important—we have a system built around hard work—we want that hard work to provide us success in the sport. We're not going to win everything, but we're going to work and do our best, and in the process, we're going to develop character in our youth to better impact our community in the future."


Forty Teams Compete in Portuguese Horseshoes


